# DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY ALUM IS NEXT VIEWPOINTS SPEAKER

Carolyn Quinn now owns Dug In Farms in White Stone Monday, May 7—11:00 am—Auditorium

Making a complete about-face, Carolyn Quinn went from living on Capitol Hill and working for the Department of Homeland Security to living on Dug In Farms in White Stone and running a produce and farm market at the end of her driveway.

Quinn will be RWC's next Viewpoints Speaker on May 7 and will talk about what it's like to serve the country in the founding moments of a new government agency.

"I was working in the Senate (for former U.S. Senator John Warner) when 9/11 occurred," Quinn said. "I left shortly afterward to join the newly established Department of Homeland Security."

DHS was initially formed by bringing 22 different agencies together, but Quinn worked for a brand new agency within Homeland Security – The Office of Science and Technology, whose mission was to find the best technologies in the country to combat threats to the homeland.

After one and a half years with DHS as a political appointee under George W. Bush, Quinn left to start her own consulting company for small businesses that wanted to work with Homeland Security or the Department of Defense. But she had found her Northern Neck farm, so she commuted back and forth to D.C. a few times per week until she decided she wanted to be here full

time instead.

#### FROM THE CHAPLAIN

I've been thinking a lot about friendship lately, observing and appreciating the power of friendships formed, for example here at RWC, of which there are so many. A good friend is indeed a precious gift. And yet, in this modern world of ours it does seem that friendship is somehow being threatened. Loneliness appears to be on the rise. Perhaps this is due, at least in part, to burgeoning technology in the form of multiplying entertainment options. Whatever the reason, this is an important trend as research seems to be showing how loneliness can have detrimental effects on us. One study showed that feeling lonely can be worse for the body than obesity or air pollution. It can convey a sense of the loss of social support and even safety. Some researchers have found a correlation between loneliness and hypertension. This all suggests to me that "connectedness" is a part of how we were created/ designed. It is not good to be alone. (Gen 2:18) What to do? Seek to be connected to caring others! Which is to say, cherish and nurture friendships. One of the many things that is so very striking to me about life here at RWC is that there are just so many different things to do. There are so many options

- **Sunday Worship**: Sundays at 4 PM in the Westbury that it would be impossible for any one person to take advantage of them all! At RWC you always have a wide array of activities to participate in and groups to be a part of. There is always caring staff. There is always one another. And yes, there is always God. You are never alone. And yet: there may be those times when you find yourself feeling exactly that. When that happens, please let us know; please let me know. We are here to help.

Quite a change from the grimness of The Sympathizer (Viet Thanh Nguyen) in 2016 and The Underground Railroad (Colin Whitehead) in 2017. The RWC Library has both, and we're getting Less. Read quickly and return so others can enjoy it.

Your Residents Association dues pay for the Association's annual grant to the RWC Library, this year \$750 – that's about \$4 per resident. This pays for our supplies, multiple copies of our book group selections, and occasional book purchases to supplement the donations. We've just ordered six just-published books – four fiction, two non-fiction. Something for everyone.
