97-YEAR-OLD RWC RESIDENT TO DISPLAY PORTRAITS IN ESTEEMED SHOW

Margaret Feil will showcase surreal art at RAL's 58th Annual Labor Day Art Show

If you see 97-year-old Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury (RWC) resident Margaret Feil's artwork in the Rappahannock Art League's (RAL's) 58th Annual Labor Day Art Show and think it's a bit strange, don't worry. She does too! Born and raised in Dinwiddie County and then living in Petersburg for most of her adult life, Feil moved to RWC with her second husband in 1999. She has been an artist for as long as her son, Dana Smith, can remember.

"She's always painted and dabbled in every medium out there," he said. "She started with oils, then encaustics (dry pigments mixed with hot wax), she settled into acrylics and then, in the 1990s she got into watercolors and collage." Feil stopped painting and creating when she moved into assisted living but started again when the well-equipped art studios opened in RWC's new Life Enrichment Center in 2017, and with encouragement from Amy Lewis, RWC's Coordinator

of Resident Program Development.

"She started with crayons and paintbrushes, but found it frustrating," Smith said. "Amy found watercolor pens with a brush on the tip and my mother loves them. She's been creating these bizarre faces. She totally focuses on doing a face. You can hear her laughing while she's working on them; she's in her own little zone. The staff compliments her work, then six minutes later she'll say, 'Who did this?' When we tell her she did, she says, 'No. I would never do anything this ugly.' She has no memory of doing any of this." Feil has been working on her faces since last fall, and Smith and his personal aide Punky Brooks, have been saving them all. Lewis suggested they enter them in RAL's Labor Day art show. They found a frame with plexiglass that fit the artwork perfectly and submitted it to the show. "When I see these faces, I think, 'Where is this coming from in her head?' he said. "My mother never did portraits except maybe two in the 1960s and 70s. She focused on still life and landscapes. These are very mysterious, very otherworldly."

Feil's work, along with that of several other local artists, will be on display at RAL for the monthlong show Aug. 28-Sept. 28. It is widely recognized as one of the longest-standing visual arts shows in Virginia.

RWC HAM AMATEUR RADIO CLUB N4RWC NEWS

The RWC Amateur Radio Club (N4RWC) meets monthly on the second Tuesday, 10:00 am in the Art Room 1 in the Life Enrichment Center. All are welcome. You do not have to be a licensed amateur operator to participate — all that is needed is an interest in radio, technology, and a bit of fun and fellowship. Each meeting has a business element followed by time exploring a topic of interest or a piece of radio or test gear.

RECYCLING NEWS

Many thanks to Ginny Burnette for collecting beer and wine bottles after RWC events such as Bingo parties. The staff including Regina, Chester, Amy and Maria, help with this collection. Ginny places a tall gray plastic container to collect **empty** bottles and cans at these events. Between January and July Ginny collected 296 glass bottles and personally took them to the Recycling Center on White Pine Dr. off of Rt. 200 opposite Hills Quarter. In addition she collected 72 aluminum cans and donated them to the Boys & Girls Club. The Club receives a small remittance for them. Every Monday morning a couple of members of the resident recycling committee collect cardboard, newspapers, and other clean paper such as junk mail at the 5 trash collection areas around campus. An RWC truck and driver accompany them and take the materials to White Pine Drive to unload. If you want to be part of the recycling team, contact John Roberts at #4238. Generally this would require only one hour per month! Fred Luxton collects metals in green trash bins in each of the 5 trash collection areas. The can is marked for CLEAN cans and has a small hole in the top. Fred takes them to Urbanna for recycling. The money he receives is donated to the RW-C Foundation.

Many of us are able to take our personal recycling to White Pine Drive.

HOOKED ON BOOKS: EXPLORE, DISCOVER AND LEARN

Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens – A book reminiscent of *Girl of the Limberlost*, published in 1909 – both stories of a girl who spends her childhood immersed in the natural world and becomes a recognized authority as an adult. In this 2018 book, Kya, derisively called Marsh Girl by the locals, grows up without family or schooling, and the story toggles between Kya's youth among the marsh creatures and the discovery of a body. RWC readers rave about the book! It's the RWC Book Group's September selection – we'll meet Monday, September 23, at 10:30 a.m. in the Rappahannock Room.

Lots of Non-Fiction News!

Lancaster County's **Mary Ball Washington** is the subject of two new biographies. The RW-C Library already has **The Widow Washington** by Matha Saxton, published in June, and we'll have Craig Shirley's book, subtitled **The Untold Story of George Washington's Mother**, when it is published in December. The Lancaster Virginia Historical Society (LVHS) and Lancaster Community Library (LCL) are co-sponsoring a talk by each author at LCL – Dr. Martha Saxton on November 17 and Craig Shirley on December 15.

Three other biographies – Admiral William H. McRaven and Oliver Wendell Holmes (both 2019 and both from Jay White) and Eleanor Roosevelt (her 1961 autobiography).

Two new Histories – The Pioneers: The Heroic Pioneers Who Brought the American Idea West by David McCullough (from Jay White) and The British Are Coming: The War for America: Lexington to Princeton by Rick Atkinson (an RW-C Library purchase).

Also, some **Public Spaces** books from Betsy Heller; the "**Best Business Book of 2018**," **Bad Blood: Secrets and Lies in a Silicon Valley Start-up**; and two **non-fiction books** from Elaine Lowrey – a 2019 book about the island of Capri and **The Day the World Came to Town: 9/11 in Gander, Newfoundland**.

Plenty of Fiction News, as well.

Look for three **Mini-Collections** on the New Books shelves – Mysteries & Recipes, donated by Rosemarie Forcum; Condensed Books, an anonymous donation; and, in response to a request, a four-book set of Mitch Albom books.

From Don Stebbins, a **new-to-us** Tom Clancy, Ken Follett and Robert Harris; from Peter Bennett, two **Mystery "oldies**;" and from Bill Williams, some **Fiction "oldies**." And from Jay White, a couple of 2019 "thrillers."

Recent purchases include *Beneath a Scarlet Sky* by Mark Sullivan (Jerry Hamm's recommendation has made it a popular book) and *The Witch Elm* by Tana French (long but gripping). And we have two books just made into movies – *Where'd You Go, Bernadette?* and *The Art of Racing in the Rain*. On August 27 (its release date), we'll have Louise Penny's latest Chief Inspector Gamache novel, *A Better Man*.
