Watercolors are king in annual exhibition

Watercolors are the star in the October art exhibition featuring works by Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury residents this year. The annual show displays work they completed over the past year in long-time teacher Pam Bowers' art classes at RWC.

Many residents have been taking Bowers' classes for the 15 years she's been teaching, but there are some new faces as well.

"Marilyn Riggs just joined the class this year," Bowers said. "She loves to paint animals. Her raccoon image is very popular and will be in the show."

Residents Pat Morris, Cecelia Barton, Brandon Louisell and Helen Woolfolk are regulars. Maxine Luxton, Sylvia Prince and Richard Brautigam also joined in the fun within the last year.

"A lot of these residents are very talented," Bowers said. "Pat Morris paints, but she also plays the piano, quilts and more! Much of her artwork is landscapes, but she wants to explore other media, too."

Although this is a watercolor class, Bowers encourages students to explore other materials of

interest.

Every student picks their own subject matter and works at their own pace. Bowers works with the students on an individual basis, although with new students she teaches a few techniques and encourages them to start finding their own ideas and style.

"I love the way everyone is now fairly independent in developing their styles and in choosing their own subject matter," Bowers said. "We use photos, still life, demos, etc. Sometimes we work with the same image, but most of the time, students are choosing their subject matter, style and composition."

Art work on display in October will feature flowers, animals, still life, landscapes and other subject matter.

Timothy Boyce practiced law for many years, most recently serving as the Managing Partner of the Charlotte, NC office of Dechert LLP. He retired in 2014 to devote full time to writing. GROUNDS & LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE

HOME AND COTTAGE RESIDENTS CAN HELP WITH GARDENING ISSUES

If you have been a gardener in your previous life, the Landscaping and Grounds staff wants you to continue this activity at RW-C. Having favorite plants near will increase your pleasure with your

new home. On page 17 of your Resident Handbook you will find specific guidelines regarding private gardens, their boundaries, and maintenance issues.

Often residents wish specific shrubs or trees to be planted near their home but outside the six feet allowance suggested for private gardens. Before taking on this task yourself, you must consult with Damon Chowning at 4040. He will be happy to talk to you about your request and suggest plants that he knows will survive in the soil and weather of this coastal area. However, the Grounds and Landscaping Committee reminds our residents that the survival of new plantings will depend on regular maintenance, especially watering. When contemplating new additions to your landscaping, please also consider taking responsibility yourselves for the watering needs of your selection. This is particularly true in this time of climate unpredictability. We cannot count on past patterns of rain and sun giving our plants their needed nourishment without our help. Also, when our house or cottage passes on to a new resident, we must consider that the maintenance will pass back to the Grounds and Landscaping staff. We ask that you consider these factors when making your requests. And if you can help us get that new tree or bush off to a good start, most likely we will find a way to make it happen.

Educated: A Memoir by Tara Westover (2017) is the RWC Book Group's October selection – we'll meet Monday, October 28, at 10:30 a.m. in the Rappahannock Room. Tara is the youngest child in a large Mormon family in remote Idaho. Her father doesn't believe in schooling, doctors and hospitals, or the federal government. And her mother won't oppose him. Powerful.

All three of the 2019 Fiction books and three of the six 2019 Non-Fiction books mentioned in the September Library Page were in circulation on September 1!

Our Large Print readers are short-changed in this world of newly published books – LP books with a 2017, 2018 or 2019 label are scarce as hen's teeth. We do have a few – Lost Roses, Where the Crawdads Sing, and Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine, and, in Non-Fiction, Educated, and Jon Meacham's The Soul of America. We've just purchased Murder in the One Percent, a mystery, and Kincaid's Hope, a "Virginia Country Roads book" with really big print. The Library featured Newly Published Large Print Books on the check-out-and-display table for a week in September, and many of the books were checked out.

We pay attention to Recommendations –
