LANCASTER MIDDLE SCHOOL CELEBRATES 20 YEARS OF EXHIBITING IN RWC'S DECEMBER SHOW

Teacher Marilyn Sprouse has proudly curated students' work since 1999

Lancaster Middle School (LMS) visual arts teacher Marilyn Sprouse hasn't run out of steam yet. Celebrating her platinum anniversary of teaching at LMS this year, Sprouse has also made sure to showcase her students' artwork at Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury's December Show for 20 years running.

And what an interesting and eclectic exhibition it is! Fourth-graders will show experimental land-scape paintings; fifth-graders used DayGlo paints to explore ideas that remind them of their own personalities; and sixth-graders will show off small Navajo rugs made of paint and yarn. "Our seventh-graders did Tiki head carvings and

eighth-graders worked on coil baskets," Sprouse said. "There will be lots of new things for RWC residents and guests to enjoy this year."

About 175 fourth- through eighth-grade art students will display their completed works in the

show.

"Peace posters remain a constant," Sprouse said. "Our sixth-, seventh- and eighth-graders created their visions of what a trip to the world of peace

might look like."

Because of her long career teaching at LMS, Sprouse now enjoys teaching children of some of the parents she taught 19 and 20 years ago. Many of them still remember their peace posters. Before she "runs out of steam", Sprouse thinks she has at least five good years left to devote to the profession she loves.

Back by popular demand will be the "Resident's Choice Award" ribbons that Sprouse created last year, so RWC residents can vote for their favorite art.

"They were a huge hit last year," she said. "The kids loved that. They collected their ribbons and were so proud."

LANCASTER BROADBAND **AUTHORITY**

The Lancaster Broadband Authority (LCBA) was established just over a year ago by the Board of Supervisors with the goal of bringing affordable and reliable broadband service to the entire county. The Authority was established with five volunteer members. One of our members recently resigned due to a possible conflict of interest. We are looking for a replacement **Director**. The successful candidate must be interested in seeking to expand internet throughout the county without favoring any particular area. This individual must be comfortable working in a collaborative team environment. Experience in telecommunications is a plus but not a requirement. Interested individuals must be willing to commit time to the Authority. There is no full time requirement but you will be required to attend our twice monthly meetings as much as possible, and the occasional special meeting and handle action items which will vary in how much time will be required. We have issued an RFI and with the future identification of a private entity being selected to assist with the expansion of broadband, we will need a Project Manager (PM). This is not an immediately available position but will be a needed fill. This will be a paid part-time position. The competitive individual will have experience in the management of projects and people. This person will be the primary point of contact for the company doing the work and will brief the Authority on the status of the broadband expansion project and any issues that arise with the project. There is also interest in possibly having an individ-

ual with marketing/negotiating skills to assist the Authority.


