

September 5-The River And The Tree - The final chapter of Revelation contains descriptions from inside the New Jerusalem, instructions for how we are to live now in light of the certainty of Heaven, and a call to be ready for the return of Christ.

September 12-The Old And The New - The judgments are past, the plagues have ended, and earth as we know it has passed away. Now, in these final chapters of Revelation, John presents a thrilling vision of a new Heaven and a new earth, as he provides a detailed description of the new Jerusalem in all its brilliance and beauty. But, the best news of John's vision is that – as citizens of Heaven – we will have direct and continual access to God and Jesus for all eternity.

September 19-The Scroll And The Lamb - Following the letters to the seven churches of Asia, the focus shifts to scenes of Heaven that constitute the rest of Revelation. In the Spirit, the Apostle John is carried into Heaven, where he views a heavenly court scene. The scene is dominated by worship and praise of God the Father, and of His Son Jesus, the glorified Lamb of God. During this heavenly visit, the sovereign purposes of God are unveiled before our eyes. September 26-What He Provides - God has given us everything we need to live a consistent Christian life. When we come to the realization that we have been liberated from sin by the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, we will want to live for Him. And that means that everything we do - as we walk, live, work, serve, and relate to others – will be done for God and for His glory.

October 3-What We Need - Left to ourselves, we are completely unable to do anything to please God or to achieve salvation. That is why it is at the Cross that we see God's love in all its fullness. Through the sacrificial death of God's Son, Jesus, we have been given an opportunity to receive a changed heart and to experience God's plan and purpose for our lives. October 10-Who Christ Is - Both fully human and fully divine, Christ alone is Lord over all things. Therefore, life change occurs when we take our eyes

off ourselves and begin to focus on the complete sufficiency of the person and work of Christ. He has this world under control and we can walk in faith and hope in every area of our lives.

October 17-Who We Are - How reluctant we are to acknowledge our sin nature, and how prone we are to run from the truth about ourselves! Let's face it: Apart from the grace of God in Christ, the condition of man is not a very pretty picture. But when we recognize our true nature and open ourselves to the grace of God, we are ready to change our focus from the bad news of our sin and guilt to the Good News of salvation through Jesus Christ.

**Grief Support**: The RWC Grief Support Group meets on the second Wednesday of each month at **11:00AM** in the Chesapeake Game Room. Our next meeting will be held on September 13th. Grief comes to us in different ways and grieving can be a difficult and painful process. Our vision is that this group will be a help to us all as we navigate the troubled waters of personal loss. We are a safe space where we support one another by careful listening and genuine caring. All is held in the strictest confidence. We occasionally supplement our conversations with knowledgeable guest speakers who help to deepen our understanding of ourselves and of one another. - 1/4 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1 Tablespoon honey
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 3 cups arugula

1 large Granny Smith apple

1/3 cup shredded Parmesan cheese

#### **MAKE THE SALAD:**

In a medium bowl, whisk together the shallots, mustard, lemon juice, honey and olive oil. Season the dressing with salt and pepper to taste. Set the dressing aside.

Slice the apple into thin matchsticks, then add the apple, arugula and Parmesan cheese to a large bowl and toss with the prepared dressing.
