ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING **STATIONS**

RWC now has two electric vehicle charging stations available. One station has a Tesla specific connector for Tesla vehicles, and the other station has a J1772 universal connector for other models of electric vehicles. The charging stations are located on a pedestal by two parking spaces on the west side of Lancaster Drive in the vicinity of the Clubroom and the Rehab Department.

Signs noting which parking spaces are reserved for charging are being made. The charging stations provide Level 2 vehicle charges for a fee that covers the cost of the energy, the cost of the charger and installation, and the cost of the software support for the chargers. Those charging vehicles will pay via app for the charges. There are no cash or prepaid features available. Charge times will vary by vehicle and level of charge desired. Those charging are asked to vacate the parking spaces once the vehicle is charged to enable the next vehicle to be charged. We will evaluate the need for additional charger locations after a period using these chargers.




SPIRITUAL DEVOTION: DEDICATED, FAITHFUL AND HOLY
