

SPIRITUAL DEVOTION: DEDICATED, FAITHFUL AND HOLY

FROM THE CHAPLAIN: Peace

Imagine sitting down by the pond in the gazebo. The sun is shining brightly, sparkling off the waters. A gentle breeze is blowing, slowly curling around your face and whispering tales of where it has been and to where it wants to go. The ducks are floating lazily upon the waters while a few geese fly overhead honking out their greetings. Deer nibble cautiously in the meadow, while squirrels playfully scamper from limb to limb. The flowers are sprouting out blooms of yellow, red, orange, white, and purple. And the trees not to be outdone, are spewing forth their kaleidoscope of colors. The grass is soft under your feet. You can smell the fragrance of the flowers carried along by the breeze, and you feel so relaxed and calm and at peace. It seems that at that moment all of creation is working in harmony to give to you those few moments of peace. And you wish that this moment could go on forever.

Peace...that which we so long for and yet at times seems so elusive. Elusive because of happenings beyond our control, or elusive because of our own busyness to accomplish "just one more thing." The word peace in scripture speaks of a "wholeness"; a bringing together of events or situations in such a way that we feel whole, content, at peace. I find that often in life it is not that peace is elusive, but rather that my life is so fractured and segmented; much like a jigsaw puzzle. And I am frantically trying to put all those pieces together so I can have peace only to find 1 or 2 pieces are missing. And now frustration sets in, and I find myself again, reaching for but never quite able to grasp...peace.

Have you been there? Wondering why life can't be more peaceful and less hectic? We are heading into Palm Sunday, the week before the crucifixion of Christ. As Jesus approaches Jerusalem and looks over the city, he begins to weep and

says "If, you, even you, had only known on this day what would bring you peace-but now it is hidden from your eyes." (Luke 19:42) You can have your day and activities all together, and be in control, and yet have no peace. Why is that? Because peace is not just in the physical realm but emanates from the very core of our spiritual beings, when in tune with our Creator. Jesus longs to give to each of us peace, but He leaves the choice to us. So how can I find that peace? Psalm 46:10 states, "Be still, and know that I am God." Find time each day to halt the carousel of chaos and confusion and be still before God. Find time to get away from social media and checking out everyone else's life and let your life be still before God. Turn off the politics of Washington DC and be still before God. Until you and I stop and are still, we will continue to miss out on the knowledge that God is there, and He is in control. APRIL WELLNESS TIP

When the nerve cells are damaged in the brain, it causes dopamine levels to decrease, leading to symptom progression. When signs are recognized and detected early, a diagnosis and treatment plan can be established. Early diagnosis can be correlated to an overall better quality of life as the disease progresses. The Parkinson's Foundation has established the acronym "ABCs of PD" to aide in education of all aspects of Parkinson's Disease. For example, "A" stands for anxiety, "B" represents balance, and "C" signifies the importance of a care partner. The entire alphabet for Parkinson's can be explored on the Parkinson's Foundation website. Again, early recognition, early diagnosis, and early treatment leads to an overall better quality of life.
