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FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

It is an odd-numbered year, so the Virginia General Assembly is busy in its short session. Fun fact, the Virginia General Assembly is the oldest, continuous lawmaking body in the Western Hemisphere, serving since 1619. Another fun fact, the Virginia General Assembly has designated the fourth Wednesday of the month of January as Brunswick Stew Day.

Throughout the year, we monitor proposed legislation that may impact some aspects of RWC life, operations, and/or finances. We do this primarily through our state association, LeadingAge Virginia (LAVA). When the General Assembly is in session, the staff at LAVA monitor legislation that may affect not-for-profit aging service organizations such as RWC, hospice, assisted living, nursing homes, and adult/senior services. Through its Public Policy Committee, LAVA staff consult with members to evaluate how proposed legislation may affect members and those we serve and provide information and resources to legislators. When the General Assembly is not in session, LAVA staff continue to cultivate relationships with legislators and state agencies and serve on study groups created to evaluate specific legislative or regulatory topics.

For several years I have been privileged to serve on the Public Policy Committee with colleagues from various LAVA member organizations. It is interesting to examine the proposed legislation and assess how it may affect residents and service providers. Often members will also testify in House or Senate committee hearings on legislation relevant to aging services. Over 2,000 pieces of legislation will be reviewed by committees in the House and Senate, with a smaller number making it to the full House and/or Senate for consideration. During short sessions like this year, it is a very fast, intense and informative process.

RWC BOOK CLUB





MONARCHS NEED OUR HELP

The monarch butterfly is facing significant threats and is currently considered endangered. Like many pollinators, monarchs have seen a drastic drop in their populations due to habitat loss, pesticide use and climate change. BUT YOU CAN MAKE A DIF-FERENCE by planting milkweed, the only food monarch caterpillars can eat, and flowering plants that provide nectar for adult monarchs. Plants that will be provided FREE to residents who will plant them

in their yards this spring (if needed, Damon and his crew will help). The list is in the sign-up book in the Life Enrichment Center. If you would like any of these plants, which will be available in late April or early May, indicate which plants and how many. The sign-up deadline is February 15th.

REPORT FROM THE GROUNDS & LANDSCAPING COMMITTEE

February is here now after an unusually cold and wet January; many of the January issues are still with us. Always remember to drip water if the temperature persistently falls into the 20s or below. Older cottages/homes may have pipes that run through the attic where insulation has compacted or shifted over the years. We don't like to see water just wasted, but it saves from having to replace walls, ceiling, and possessions below. Keep cabinet doors open on kitchen/bathroom sinks. To avoid slips/trips/falls, continue your observations and report on streetlight outages and walkway icing. Damon and his crew are prompt to remedy unsafe conditions using plows, shovels and deicing compounds on the campus. If you walk your dog, please wash their paws with fresh water to prevent any unnecessary injuries. Our campus is replete with native and non-native bushes and trees which could suffer from extreme cold. A few years ago an extraordinary cold snap gripped Virginia and most evergreen privets (Japanese ligustrum) died off in masse. They were never replanted but homeowners replaced with native bushes. We currently have an abundance of Japanese Camellias, azaleas, and other non-hardy perennials so these may be adversely affected if a cold snap is persistent here. Soon, however, February will be over and thoughts of homegrown tomatoes will be on our minds. Those of you who like to grow vegetables are encouraged to sign up for an available plot in our community raised-bed garden. Please call Maxine Luxton X4200. Just remember: For a reason, February is our shortest month.

High blood pressure, high cholesterol, smoking, and excessive alcohol use are all factors that can be controlled to lower the risk of heart disease.

A well-balanced diet consists of lean proteins (lean meat, eggs, beans), fruits and vegetables, whole grains, and low-fat dairy products. It's best to choose foods that are high in fiber and low in sodium. A great grocery shopping tip is that the healthiest foods are typically found along the perimeter of the store in the produce, meat, and dairy sections!
