NORTHERN NECK ORCHESTRA CON-DUCTOR REPPER TO PRESENT EARLY OCTOBER 'ENCORE' AT RWC

Think of this as an encore presentation by the Northern Neck Orchestra's Music Director Michael Repper of pieces from his new recording of works by early 20th Century British composer Samuel Coleridge-Taylor.

After a recent highly acclaimed performance before a capacity crowd at Good Luck Cellars, the Grammy Award-winning Repper will repeat his high-energy presentation at Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury on Friday, October 3 at 3:00 p.m.

The talk is open to the public with no admission charge. Signed copies of the recording will be available for purchase for \$10.

The album, recorded with the National Philharmonic, features Coleridge-Taylor's *Toussaint L'Ouverture*, *Ballade Op. 4*, and suites from *24 Negro Melodies* and was selected by National Public Radio as Album of the Week when it was released. Repper, an accomplished pianist, will complement his remarks with his own performances of excerpts from Coleridge-Taylor's music.

The Northern Neck Orchestra will perform five of these melodies at its opening concert of the 2025-2026 concert season on October 4 at the Lancaster Elementary School Theater.

According to Michelle Lybarger, President of the Northern Neck Orchestra and physical therapist at RWC, "As an added feature, the event will begin with a continuous-loop audio visual montage of 40 still photos taken by local photographer Kent Eanes with a sound track featuring excerpts from a recent Northern Neck concert." Designed by architect Alexander Parris in the Federal style, the Mansion sits close to the site of a modest frame structure that served as the home to Virginia's governors after the capitol moved from Williamsburg to Richmond in 1780. Virginia's 18th Governor, James Barbour, moved into the newly built residence in 1813 whichand has been occupied by Virginia's governors ever since, making the Executive Mansion the oldest continuously occupied Governor's residence in the United States.

The Mansion's original grounds included a separate cook house, smokehouse, stable, ice house, and carriage and cannon houses. Three of these original buildings remain today including the main house, cook house and the carriage house. The Mansion also includes private living quarters for the First Family.



As they travel, the unlikely pair build a tentative bond of trust and care amidst the harsh aftermath of the Civil War. As I write this, it is the first day of Fall, and Fall is my favorite time of year. Growing up in Michigan, the colors were gorgeous. The hills were covered with trees whose branches dotted the landscape with hues of red, orange, yellow and green. Families were out on their color tours after having searched for which areas had the most vibrant colors. Some of my last memories with my mother were taking her out to see these colors. It was a time of light jackets, sweaters, apple picking and apple cider, caramel apples, football and pumpkin bread. And of course, the temperatures were cooler.

I can recall as a child raking a path through all the leaves in the front yard so that we could play the "Fox the Chesapeake Game Room." and the Hound". And when we tired of that game we raked the leaves into a pile and jumped into them and watched one another disappear under the pile of

And my favorite; I would travel out onto Old Mission Peninsula and go to Grand Traverse Lighthouse and walk along the shore. There is just something special to me about being at the lighthouse and listening to the waves lap up onto the shore. As I walked along I looked for Petoskey stones, and those stones that were not were used as skipping stones.

Those days seemed like they were so long ago. And yet, my memories help me recall them as if they just happened yesterday. GROUNDS & LANDSCAPING REPORT

Another month has slipped by and now October begins. October has always been the month of bountiful harvests and here at RWC we begin to see the days shorten, the weather cooler, and the magnificence of our campus tree foliage beginning to display their full glory. Our earliest crimson shows on the leaves of our native black gum tree; sassafras, also a native, is turning golden yellow. Soon the dark reds of the dogwoods and the yellows of our majestic tulip poplars will brighten our neighborhood. October is the month to pull out a good book, sit outside in the cool breeze and savor our surroundings. Mosquitoes will be gone and the quietness of RWC will sooth our spirits. It is now time to think about our autumn flowering plants. Chrysanthemums are available in the garden centers and grocery store lots. These long-lasting blossoms will brighten your door way or balcony and with a little care, can last until Thanksgiving and sometimes Christmas. These pot-bound beauties must be kept watered daily if you want them to last. When you bring home the potted plant, make sure that water drains from the pot. The plastic wrapping holds in water and if not allowed to drain after every watering, will cause the roots to rot. Place a saucer under the pot and you will be good to go! Damon will be working to remove the summer flowers and replacing them with the fall/winter pansies. His crew will also get the turf aerated, fertilized, and seeded. Monarch Season 2025

The generation of Monarch butterflies expected to start the fall migration to Mexico began to eclose on 1 September, so the RW-C team geared up to begin tagging. Unfortunately, disaster struck. From 1 to 19 September, only 7 butterflies were tagged and released while 13 butterflies eclosed with defective wings. Since they were unable to fly, they died. We don't fully understand what happened, but strongly suspect some of our milkweed had become infected with a parasite called ophryocystis elektroscirrha - called "OE" since its name is not pronounceable by most of us. This OE parasite gets deposited onto certain types of milkweed. Monarch eggs are laid, they become caterpillars which eat the milkweed and get infected. The caterpillars can form into a normal looking chrysalis that either dies at that stage or result in a butterfly that ecloses with defective wings. We have seen several types of deformities from wings that have wrinkles that prevent the butterfly from gaining flight high enough to travel, to wings that cannot become free from the chrysalis shell so they don't unfurl, to wings that simply do not fully form. In any case, it has been heartbreaking seeing these little miracles of nature struggle against the inevitable.

So since tagging began on 1 September, we have tagged only 7 healthy monarchs while 13 have died. During the same period, we destroyed 6 chrysallides that clearly were sick.

In total, 98 butterflies were released this season before closing down our enclosures. Further activities will consist of capturing, tagging and releasing butterflies in the wild on campus. If anybody has an unused butterfly net they would like to donate, please contact Nick Ferriter, x 4216.
