#### **BOOK GROUP**



## SPIRITUAL DEVOTION: DEDICATED, FAITHFUL AND HOLY

As I write this article I am sitting in my son's house in Fort Worth, Texas. It has been 3 months since my daughter in law was diagnosed with tongue cancer. Since then, she has had the surgery with the cancer successfully removed from her tongue. She had to have a tracheotomy done as her tongue would swell from surgery, and that has been removed and almost fully healed. She had her right neck opened and 16 lymph nodes removed. Only 1 was cancerous. They had to take tissue from her wrist to rebuild her tongue, as well as an artery to reconnect the tongue to the neck. The wrist has been slow to heal but finally had the bandage removed and that is about 75% healed. They had to take a large skin graft from her thigh to patch the wrist. Plus, she needed a feeding tube. She was eating pureed food but now back to eating all through the feeding tube as her throat has developed sores and blisters from the radiation, plus a fungal infection in her mouth. Her strength fades quickly each day after treatment and some moving about, and yet, she has a positive attitude and laughs and smiles, and is doing all that she needs to. Radiation will continue for 3.5 more weeks.

This week I will spend time working through the emotions with both of them. When a crisis hits, we go into Monday, November 24 at 1:00 PM survival mode and tend to push down the emotions just to get through it all. Yet, eventually the emotions must be dealt with and allowed to come out. I am sure there will be anger and fear, as well as trepidation about the future. All of that is normal emotions. Yet, there is also, relief and gratitude, thankfulness and hope. There is the realization that life can never be taken for granted and each day is a gift from God. Life is like a vapor scripture tells us, it is here and then it is gone. And so, we see that life is either invested or it is spent.


#### For me:

- 1. I am grateful for time with family. I have no guarantee of tomorrow and I want to make the most of this week.
- 2. I want to invest my time and not just spend it. Spending can be frivolous and spur of the moment, whereas investing takes thought and consideration.

The hot, humid, sticky days of summer will be over, and the cool, crisp, autumnal breezes will be upon us. This rapid flux to our daily living will bring new and important environmental changes. Daylight Savings Time is ending and with it our normal summer routines will be upended. Early strollers or dog walkers will have a brighter morning, but walking or picking up dinner meals will happen in the dark. If you see any walking hazards report them immediately. Leaves covering a walkway will present a slipping hazard and need removal at once. Also, lights along the pathways should always be functioning. If you see burned-out lamps, report them. Always be vigilant in your daily outside activities. On a brighter note, our woodlands will put on its wonderous display of reds, yellows, copper, green, orange colors. What a good time to get about to see our beautiful campus. Damon has seeded, installed the fall pansies and will soon be removing leaves. Remember: Doug Tallamy suggests we keep leaves overwinter so insects and other critters sheltering in the leaves will be available for the birds and their babies next spring. So if you have room in the corner of your yard, just ask the groundskeeper to let them stay until next March. Bird feeding will begin now and to entice the gold finches and other small birds like chickadees and titmice feed them only thistle seed using a special feeder designed especially for thistle seed.
