



Friday, December 19—Ted Koppel with Amna Nawaz: 40 Years: Moments That **Mattered**

The Richmond Forum opened its 40th season with a standing ovation for the return of Ted Koppel, who inaugurated The Forum's first season in 1987. A month into the job, the September 11 attacks changed the world. "I got to watch the very best journalists in the business do what they do best," Nawaz said. "I am a journalist today because of that day."
