VIRGINIA HOLOCAUST MUSEUM & LUNCH AT STATION 2 IN RICHMOND Thursday, January 29-9:30am-Front Lobby Cost= guided tour =\$10+lunch\$

The museum provides a chronological walk

through the history of the holocaust, drawing in stories of some survivors who made the Richmond area their home in the aftermath of the war. One particular family, the Ipsons (from Lithuania), are given extra focus in a section that we refer to as The Ipson Saga. The whole family were/are Holocaust survivors, and the son, Jay Ipson, cofounded our museum in 1997. Your tour guided will walk you through a short film and their exhibits. It's a fair bit of walking but opportunities to sit are available throughout. 2 scooters available at the museum. Station 2 was constructed in the former home

of Engine Company 2. Built in 1899, the build-

ing housed Richmond's second city owned fire

house.



GROUNDS & LANDSCAPING REPORT

Happy New Year, 2026. Our first wintery blasts have come and gone, now, winter is primed for our next few months. Our daylight hours are increasing (slowly) and soon the birds will be building nests. Until then, we will experience freezing days, icy walks, wind-swept landscapes and weather surprises. We must be mindful of ice buildup on sidewalks and streets where we walk. Report untreated areas prone to freezing. Damon is always prompt in treating these areas for our safety but walking your dog can be problematic because these street chemicals are harmful, and perhaps deadly, to our pet. Be sure to wash and dry their paws before they begin licking them. To help our shut-in blues, forcing forsythia stems to bloom is always welcome. After a cold winter, the buds of this species are preparing to open into their beautiful yellow flowers. You can fool Mother Nature by cutting stems and placing them in a vase of water inside. After about a week or two, the little buds will burst forth into a welcome sunny yellow display. I suggest that the stems be cut in mid to late January so that you can enjoy an early spring in February. We are fortunate to live here and be able to enjoy the kindness of Brent & Becky's offer to provide non-profits with select flower bulbs. We are making arrangements to add a little cheer to the foundation plantings at the Birdsong House.


