FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

It has been a busy Spring as we replace and upgrade our Electronic Health Record (EHR) system. We have utilized the current system since March 2014, so we have quite a large amount of data to transfer to the new system. As with any software, it has new features and different processes, and our teams are configuring processes and workflows in the new system. Once built, staff will be trained on the new system and processes before we transition to the new software on July 1.

Teams from the Health Center, Assisted Living, Birdsong House, Resident Clinic, Social Services, Activities, At Home, Therapy, Business Office, Marketing, and Resident Services all utilize the EHR system. It really touches most aspects of RWC's life and operations. The new EHR will also include special sub-systems that are designed specifically for home care for the At Home department and therapy and rehab for our Therapy department. It will also include a new electronic interface to Main Street Pharmacy to improve medication administration and reduce manual processes, such as faxing prescriptions to the pharmacy. The new EHR also has electronic signature capabilities which we will utilize to capture signatures electronically when possible to reduce paper usage and physical file storage space.

During June, we will have to maintain records in our current system while transferring records to the new EHR system. Since that cannot happen in one day, our teams will have to operate in the current system, while putting data in the new system to make the transition on July 1 as smooth as possible. Most importantly, we continue to provide care and services while learning a new system and maintaining the legacy system. It can be a little intimidating to undertake a project this size. You can help us make this a success through your prayers, patience, and understanding as we go through the next 30-45 days of this transition.

We also welcome our 2026 summer interns who will be working in various departments. Internships are a great way to introduce the many job and career opportunities at RWC and in the senior living/healthcare arena to the next generation workforce. Through the summer residents will have opportunities to interact and share their experiences with our interns.

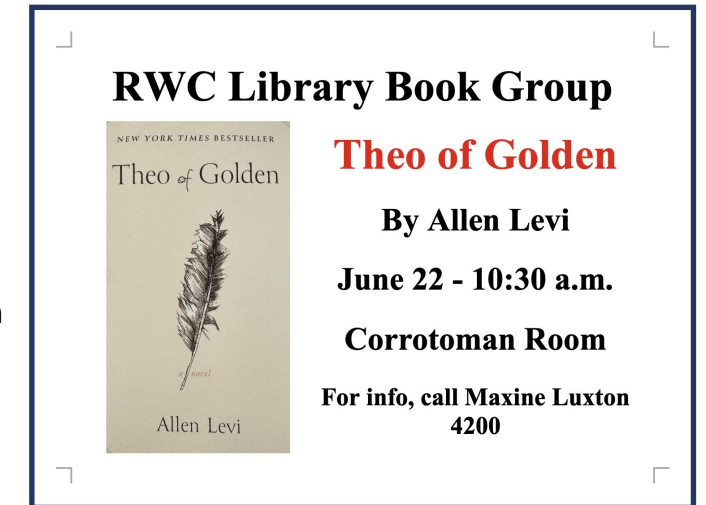

The fight claims us, but you will find us here for all eternity; as though we hadn't been- the price for our posterity-do you remember when? Lest you forget - our fight is over now, and it is won; but we are not alive to share the goal of glory. Only see that all your sons recall our guns- before the drums have ceased to roll! Our standards lie amuck where last we falling stuck them waving proud. Although the next will take it up, we claim our pluck has written freedom's newest text - before the drums have ceased to roll.

On, comrades, on! We stay behind- the peace is yours to win. The fight claims us, but you will find us here for all eternity; as though we hadn't been the price for your posterity - do you remember when? And after war deserts our kind, will you remember when?

Andre Poitevin Fallwell, 20 years old.
Written on the battle front in France, October 25th,

1944. He was killed in action in Luxembourg on Christmas Day, December 25th, 1944.

This memorial Day will you remember those who gave their lives so you can worship as you choose, live as you desire, and enjoy the freedoms that many in other nations would die for? Will you remember when?

MONARCH REPORT

On May 20, our first butterfly of the 2026 season eclosed and was released. Last year our first butterfly eclosed just a few days earlier on May 17."

We now have 4 chrysalides in the LEC enclosure. If you look closely and compare them with each other, you will see that one of them is starting to change from a soft jade color to a slightly darker jade. This is a sign that beautiful monarch wings are forming inside. This chrysalis will be the second to eclose with the others following close behind.

We have established a second enclosure. It is located on the Health Care patio amid a container garden filled with strawberries, blueberries, tomatoes, cucumber and bell pepper plants, various herbs, and flowers including zinnias, alstroemeria, and lavender. This enclosure currently has two chrysalides. We hope that the flowers in their immediate surroundings might entice newly eclosed butterflies to linger awhile for residents to enjoy.

We had a disastrous close to our season last year just as we were preparing to begin our tagging effort. Our butterflies didn't fully eclose. They were unable to completely unfurl their wings and dry them, therefore were unable to fly. While we are unsure of what caused this, but believe the caterpillars may have been infected with a parasite that lived on the milkweed they consumed, so the butterflies were doomed from the start. We can only hope that healthy butterflies will eclose this year. Stay tuned. Jeannie McGuire

FITNESS CENTER NEWS

While summer brings us warmth and bloom, prolonged exposure to excessive heat in summer months can be dangerous. This is especially true for older adults. Every summer, more than 600 Americans die of health problems caused by excessive heat and humidity. Older adults and individuals with chronic medical conditions are at high risk of developing heat-related illnesses, because of aging-related physical changes in the body, chronic health conditions, and even effects of taking some medications.

When the temperature climbs above 80°F, older adults need to be proactive and take precautions to avoid ailments due to excessive heat. Keep in mind the following tips when trying to stay cool.

1. STAY AWAY from direct sun exposure as much as possible. If possible, plan your outdoor activities either early in the morning or when the sun starts to set.
 2. STAY HYDRATED. Drink plenty of cool water, clear juices, and other liquids that don't contain alcohol or caffeine. Alcohol and caffeine cause you to lose water in your body by making you urinate more.
 3. DRESS APPROPRIATELY. Whenever you can, try wearing loose, light-colored clothes. Avoid dark-colored clothes as they may absorb heat.
 4. AIR CONDITIONING is your friend in summer. Spend as much time as possible in air conditioned spaces.
- DID SOMEONE SAY SUNBURN? Buy a broad spectrum sunscreen lotion or spray with sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 or higher
